## Two New Research Reports on Housing and Farmland Inform Valley Policymakers

Two new reports are the focus of attention ahead of the California Air Resources Board Meeting in Bakersfield on January 24<sup>th</sup>: (1) <u>"A Home for</u> <u>Everyone: San Joaquin Valley Housing Preferences and Opportunities to 2050"</u> written by Arthur Nelson for the Council of Infill Builders, and (2) <u>"Saving Farmland, Growing Cities"</u> by the American Farmland Trust.

Newspapers in the San Joaquin Valley have carried stories related to the AFT's report, including the <u>Modesto Bee</u>, <u>Fresno Business Journal</u> and <u>Bakersfield Californian</u>. Also, bloggers writing on the region and advocating for policy re-direction, like <u>ClimatePlan</u> and <u>Amanda Eaken</u>, have also picked up the research and forwarded it to constituencies throughout the region.

The CARB meeting in Bakersfield (Kern County Board of Supervisors, 1115 Truxtun Avenue at 9am) will be discussing both air quality related to particulate matter and the status of SB 375 implementation in the region related to Sustainable Communities Strategy requirements.
